

#### **Meet the Councillors**


Councillors are here to support residents as much as we can and we thought it would be useful to restart the 'Meet the Councillors' sessions.

### PLANNING UPDATE

#### Maidstone Borough Council Local Plan

The Maidstone Borough Local Plan 2021-2038 was adopted in March 2024. Regrettably, Maidstone Borough Council (MBC) has officially lost its 5year land housing supply (reduced to 4.5 years) and speculative planning applications are flooding in. Unfortunately, this means in planning terms a 'tilted balance' in developers' favour without this 5-year land supply. This situation has not been helped with Central Government's requirement for an additional 10% more house building along with delays on the three garden sites and a slow housing market. However, MBC favour sites already in the local plan and not speculative applications.



#### **Land North of Marden**

The Parish Council understands that residents are nervous about the possibility of a speculative planning application for Land North of Marden. This site has been on the radar since 2019 at the MBC Call for Sites consultation and this site wasn't included in the MBC Local Plan adopted in 2024, although other garden community sites were.

A Full Parish Council meeting took place on 9th September where the Chairman Cllr Adrian Rabot read out a statement giving an update on Land North of Marden. Borough Councillors Grace Couch, Claudine Russell and Mike Summersgill, and our County Councillor Brian Black also addressed the meeting which was attended by quite a few residents. This meeting was for the Parish Council to provide as much information to residents as possible and we will keep you informed throughout the stages of public consultation and the planning process as we want to bring everyone into the conversation at an early stage. The meeting was not a decision-making meeting, and councillors did not vote on whether they agree or disagree with the proposal - that will come at a later stage when and if a planning application is submitted.

It is important to know that councillors must be very careful not to give their opinion as to whether they agree or disagree with this potential proposal. Councillors must maintain an open mind until all the facts are available. If the Parish Council makes any public statement, in support or against this proposal before an application is submitted and discussed at a Parish Council meeting, then they run the risk of the applicant claiming we were not looking at the application with an open mind as we had predetermined our view. The consequence would be that the Parish Council's view would not be taken into account when a final decision is made.

Furthermore, the Parish Council makes recommendations to the relevant planning officer only – it does not decide on planning applications – the final decision to grant or refuse planning applications rests with the Local Planning Authority, usually MBC.

#### Other Planning News

We have also heard no more news on the development of land east of Albion Road and North of Copper Lane for the erection of up to 117 dwellings, which has been permitted by the Government Planning Inspector. Undoubtedly the developer will be submitting a full planning application at some point.

The contentious planning application for a chicken farm at Reed Court Farm on Hunton Road was refused earlier this year. The developer has six months from the refusal date to consider an appeal which has not happened.

Thank you to those residents who attended the Planning Meeting on 7th August to express their concerns on the full planning application for land adjacent to 16 Lucks Way for the erection of a two-bed detached dwelling house. Councillors voted unanimously to refuse this application which MBC has now refused.

### Marden Neighbourhood Plan Review (MNP) – Regulation 14 Consultation

The Parish Council has been reviewing and updating the MNP which is a legal document and is part of the planning policies within Maidstone Borough Council (MBC).

Councillors refer to the policies when considering planning applications to ensure they are compliant, and MBC take them into consideration when assessing planning applications.

It's designed to ensure that Marden will continue to be a thriving parish, to maintain its individual character, heritage and community spirit. It aims to balance the existing and future needs of residents and businesses to fulfil Marden's function as a Rural Service Centre, by managing the expansion of housing provision, employment, education and recreation opportunities, whilst retaining and enhancing the natural beauty and biodiversity of the surrounding rural area.

As part of Regulation 14, we consulted with various groups, statutory bodies, stakeholders, businesses, village groups and residents on the proposed changes to the MNP. The document was submitted to MBC but unfortunately, we need to repeat the consultation as we did not submit a modifications statement which is currently being worked on.




### PROJECT UPDATE

#### Marden Parish Emergency Resilience Plan

The Parish Council has now drafted a new version of what was the previous Emergency Plan into a Parish Emergency Resilience Plan in line with new guidelines from the Kent and Medway's Resilience Forum. This will be used in the event of an emergency affecting our community.

In most cases, emergencies are dealt with by the emergency services and other key responders such as health authorities, local authorities and utility companies who all have well-rehearsed plans to deal with such situations. The Parish Council may be asked to support these agencies with these incidents and there may be circumstances, such as widespread flooding or a train crash, where the arrival of the emergency services and other responders could be delayed, or when essential utilities and highways access may be compromised. In these circumstances it is important that our community can help itself until assistance arrives and it will do this more effectively if it has a plan in place.



To be able to set up this Emergency Resilience Plan, we are putting a shout out for volunteers with an IT background, communications, fire, medical, 4x4 and chainsaw licence holders to come forward to sit on the Resilience Planning Sub-Group and be included in the contact list for emergencies. The Parish Office will also be contacting village groups and organisations for involvement to assist in emergencies and to investigate facilities as rest centres.

#### Marden Annual Parish Meeting (APM)

The Annual Parish Meeting is a meeting of all the local government electors for the Parish and is called by the Chairman of the Parish Council, six local government electors or two Parish Councillors.

It is held to provide the opportunity to discuss local matters and receive Council and village annual reports and is distinct from a Parish Council meeting.

According to the Local Government Act 1972, every parish must hold this meeting annually between 1st March and 1st June. The meeting allows residents to voice their opinions and engage in discussions about parish affairs. It serves as a direct form of democracy enabling community involvement in local governance.

#### Allotments at Highwood Green

The S106 Deed of Variation document which allows Redrow to transfer the land to the Parish Council has been signed off by MBC's legal department and Redrow must transfer the allotments to the Parish Council by 26<sup>th</sup> November.

However, before the transfer is complete, we need to ensure that all the work we specified a long time ago undertaken to the roof to bear the is completed by Redrow at the allotment area. #### Marden Playing Field **Changing Rooms**

Marden Parish Council recently submitted a formal planning application to Maidstone Borough Council which has now received approval. We are now seeking budget costs for the works, and the project will mainly be funded with \$106 monies received from Highwood Green, Windsor Meadow and Parsonage developments which cannot legally be used elsewhere. If the project, then we will seek grants from outside bodies and will not be using money from the council tax precept.

#### Public Conveniences Solar Panels & when this will be done. **Water Fountain Station**

Whilst Maidstone Borough Council (MBC) own the public toilets building, Road Junction the Parish Council maintains this important village facility. As part of our environmental responsibilities, the source of great frustration - another Parish Council have been exploring the possibility of installing solar panelslocal government. Having secured a on the roof to offset the cost of electricity in the toilets and a water

fountain station outside the facility. A structural survey has been undertaken which advises that work should be weight of the panels. A draft license for building alterations has been received from MBC, and we have obtained a couple of grants towards funding the panels. It was agreed at Full Council on 14<sup>th</sup> October to continue with this work and hopefully will be completed early 2026.

#### Litter Bin Audit

The Parish Council undertook a litter bin audit in the village and one area in the High Street (near the Post Office Café and Marden Bakery) needs a bin where a lot of rubbish is often deposited. Maidstone Borough Council (MBC) advised they are unable to provide any new bins in the parish but are happy to relocate one. However, a new bin has further funding is needed to complete been installed outside OneStop and a twin bin outside of Kebab Fish Knight and Nisa store. MBC agreed to move a bin opposite the West End Stores to the corner of Albion Road/High Street and the Clerks have chased MBC to see

### Fingerpost at Plain Road/Thorn

This important heritage asset was demolished in 2022 and has been a example of the cogs grinding slowly in contractor to remove the post and another contractor to repair it, we were then advised by KCC that we are not permitted to reinstall a cast iron signpost on safety reasons. Our County Councillor Brian Black has kindly agreed to help, and he has raised the issue with a cabinet member on KCC. However, if this is not possible, the Parish Council will consider replacing it with a wooden sign instead of cast iron (like the one at the Goudhurst Road/Plain Road/Sheephurst Lane junction).

#### Christmas Lights in the Village

The Parish Council is hoping that we will receive a donation from our County Councillor to have another lamppost adorned with a wraparound Christmas light. The lights are installed on lampposts at the beginning of December from the High Street to the West End to brighten the village centre up over the festive period.

# HIGHWAYS & PUBLIC TRANSPORT

#### Marden Parish Council Highways Working Group

As a result of the recent Marden
Community Survey, highways were in
the top three issues residents would like
the Parish Council to address. A
Highways Working Group has been set
up specifically to put more focus on
highways issues, monitor the Highways
Improvement Plan (HIP) - not just on its
progress but recommend any additions and monitor the annual prioritisations.
The working group will proactively
identify where there are highways
concerns and seek appropriate solutions

and monitor highways maintenance such as footways, faint lines in the village etc and draft responses to any surveys relating to highways.

#### Highways Improvement Plan (HIP)

Highways issues continue to be a cause for concern for all, and we asked for residents' views at a consultation earlier this year about the HIP. Cllrs reviewed your comments and sent the Highways Improvement Plan Priority List to KCC Highways for 2025/26 earlier in the summer (see list below). A site meeting was held on 8<sup>th</sup> September with a representative from Kent Highways and Cllrs took the representative to the sites to see firsthand our concerns. Councillors will be reviewing the recommendations from Kent Highways and will update in future newsletters.

- Bend at West End a timeline of accidents has been sent such as vehicles hitting walls, fences and lamp columns, HGV's mounting the footways etc.
- B2079 Beech Bridge The narrow carriageway between Beech Bridge Cottages and south of the junction with Roughlands Lane resulting in kerb/verge damage from vehicular over-running particularly HGVs mounting the verge.
- Howland Road (bend at Rose and Crown Cottages) – as residents are all too aware, this is a dangerous and blind bend where parking is permitted with no proper footway,

### Highways Improvement Plan (HIP) Contd

- Howland Road (bend at Rose and Crown Cottages) Contd - and many vehicles drive too fast often hitting stationary vehicles. There is no offroad parking for residents, so all cars are parked on the road leaving only a single width road for driving around the bend.
- B2079 Winchett Hill to Marden
  Beech -The road is heavily used by
  motorists including HGVs, farm
  vehicles, cars and cyclists and
  several accidents have occurred
  where vehicles have ended up in
  residents' gardens.
- Dropped Kerbs some footways in the village centre lack dropped kerbs for those residents' using wheelchairs, pushchairs etc and many others lack tactile paving for the visually impaired. The locations where there is a need for dropped kerbs are in Goudhurst Road – entrance to Marden Primary Academy, High Street – at entrance to the Old Market, Chantry Road/Lime Close junctions and Chantry Road by the bungalows.
- Pedestrian Crossing in the High Street - it has been highlighted by residents that an additional crossing is needed in the High Street by the pharmacy, but Kent Highways has advised this is not feasible as it does not meet the criteria and it would be very difficult to site a formal crossing in this locality and achieve the 5m minimum clearance from any

junctions or accesses that are required. A signalised crossing would cost in excess of £200,000 and unfortunately Kent Highways are not able to facilitate or fund.

At the site meeting, Cllrs also mentioned that cars are sometimes being parked on the newly extended footway at the Pattenden Lane junction and the Kent Highways Design Team will visit the site to see what can be done to prevent this happening in the future. Cllrs also requested that the DYL at the junction be reinstated.

Kent Highways are also looking at installing a village gateway sign by the planter in Maidstone Road and now Marden in Bloom have received a license for the planter there, hopefully Kent Highways will install the sign.

The results from the Traffic Regulation Order for Single Yellow Line proposals in Goudhurst Road (9.30am-10.00am) and Double Yellow Lines in Albion Road have now been approved and installed. You can find the HIP document: https://bit.ly/MPCHIP2025

#### Speed Watch

The Parish Council carried out a speed watch session in July in Pattenden Lane when 47 vehicles were recorded as speeding and four vehicles were sent a warning letter as it was not the first time they had been recorded by a Speed Watch session. Another session took place in August on the Goudhurst Road, without any speeding vehicles recorded, and then another session in

Pattenden Lane on National Speed Watch Day on 12<sup>th</sup> September when 12 vehicles were recorded as speeding (the fastest at 49mph).

### Hedges or Trees Encroaching the Public Highways and Footways

Narrow footways particularly in Church Green, High Street, Howland Road and the West End can make it difficult for buggies and assisted vehicles to navigate especially when there are overhanging/overgrown hedges/trees. If there is overhanging vegetation on a public road or footway, you can let Kent Highways know who have an obligation to ensure private property owners cut back any hedges, vegetation or shrubs that encroach onto the highways. They require private property owners to cut back any vegetation from streetlights to allow the full beam of light to shine onto the ground and ensure the full width of the footway

is available for use by pedestrians. You may receive a letter from Kent Highways asking you to trim back your vegetation and they will check the progress of the work.

If highway vegetation is overhanging your property, you have the right under UK law to cut it back to your property boundary. For more information or to report a problem, check out: https://bit.ly/KCCVegetation

### **DRAINAGE & WATER**

Flooding and drainage continue to be high on the Parish Council's agenda and over the spring and summer, we were fortunate there were no problems. Let's hope this autumn/winter, we have no issues, and the Flood Wardens don't need to be called out.

Despite the extensive work undertaken by Southern Water last year, Maynards Sewer overflowed yet again at the beginning of the year. We have chased Southern Water requesting full details on the questions raised in a letter sent in January, but still no updates have been received.

As most residents will know, flooding is a risk for all of us every year throughout the autumn and winter when we quite often have heavy and prolonged rain and some of our road's flood becoming dangerous to drive. We have been given permission by Kent Highways to close roads in the event of flooding.

### DRAINAGE & WATER CONTD

We are grateful to those residents who are flood wardens and hold road closure signs to put them out in the event of flood

Marden is part of a group along with Collier Street, Yalding and Hunton that will co-ordinate road closures in the area when flooding is a risk and work alongside agencies such as the Environment Agency, Maidstone Borough Council, Kent Highways and the Police. Marden Parish Council, in collaboration with the Environment Agency and Kent Resilience Forum, has developed a Community Flood Plan for Marden.

The roads that may need to be closed if there is flooding are: Sheephurst Lane, Plain Road, Green Lane and Hunton Road from the end of Pattenden Lane through Chainhurst to Hunton Bridge. If any of these roads are on your normal route, then please check out alternative routes now rather than waiting until they have been closed. It may not be possible to put out diversion signs so remember the safest route will always be the main roads and high ground.

In previous winters we have experienced very heavy episodes of ice and snow and if this happens again, please note that most of our lanes are not treated and can become very icy. As ever be prepared and identify safe routes and use the main roads wherever possible.

### **HEALTH & WELLBEING**

The Parish Council tries to promote health and wellbeing in the community and provide as much information as possible in each newsletter and on social media. With pressure on public services including the NHS, it is important that we continue to increase awareness on health-related matters across the community to make residents more aware of self-help and to continue to support Marden Medical Centre as much as we can. The Marden Community Forum is made up of representatives from the Parish Council, the Medical Centre, Marden Church, Marden Primary Academy, the PPG, Marden Pre-School, Maidstone Family Hubs etc who discuss health and wellbeing issues so we are aware of what is going on in our community and can help signpost each other and residents on health and wellbeing matters.

### Health & Wellbeing Support in Marden

Marden no longer has a community warden, a Children's Centre or any youth support services and now we have little support from the charity Involve which puts additional pressure on our already overstretched Medical Centre. Marden is fortunate that Marden Foodbank provides excellent voluntary work to those vulnerable members of the community spearheaded by Marden Church.

The Involve Children's
Navigator/Worker still attends Marden
Foodbank regularly and signposts
residents who have need of the
service, but the regular support to fill
in forms etc is no more and the
Medical Centre no longer has a link
worker. A representative from the KCC
Family Hubs does attend the
Foodbank when she can and will be
supporting the new S.E.N.D. group
and hopefully at Marden Primary
Academy as KCC has also reduced
access to the S.E.N.D services at the
school.

As everyone knows, NHS services are very busy and it's important to come forward with any health concerns, but you can help ease the pressure by choosing the right service.

Emergency departments are currently extremely busy treating high numbers of patients. This service is for those who need it most – like people with severe chest pains, serious head injuries, loss of consciousness or breathing difficulties.

#### Hedge Planting behind Marden Cemetery

The Parish Council has already planted many saplings on our open space, and we planted 1,000 whips to form a hedgerow on land behind Marden Cemetery and another 1,000 whips as part of the Kent Plan Tree initiative. The aim of the project is to create a new 'mini woodland' for Marden as part of an expansion to Marden Cemetery. Fortunately, most of the saplings have survived.

The Parish Council has now applied for free saplings from Maidstone Borough Council to enable the boundary hedge at the back of the cemetery to be completed.

This is due to be held on Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> January from 9.30am (date will be confirmed nearer the time) and we are hoping the Police Cadets will be assisting with the planting of 1,000 indigenous hedge whips - it would be great if we could have some volunteers to help; just bring along a spade and get digging!

#### **Nature Recovery Fund**

Maidstone Borough Council has been nature recovery projects in Maidstone. The Parish Council has submitted an Expression of Wish form to MBC to apply for some of this funding to undertake a project within the village. We have a few ideas up our sleeves, but this will be dependent on the required criteria.

#### Green Homes/Retrofit

Retrofit refers to any improvement work on an existing building to improve its energy efficiency, making them easier to heat, able to retain that heat for longer, and replacing fossil fuels with renewable energy.

The Parish Council is currently exploring the possibility of KCC organising a Green Homes event in the Spring which has already been run with Maidstone and Bearsted Climate Action Networks (CANs).


The event aims to help residents to better understand how to improve energy efficiency in their homes and grants and advice to install measures such as insulation, solar PV and heat pumps will be shared.

#### Idling - Switch Off Your Engine

(Endorsed by Marden Medical Centre) awarded £500,000 for communities for Idling means leaving a vehicle's engine running while it is stationary. While this is often because of everyday traffic, there are some instances - such as waiting for children outside schools and sitting in total gridlock - when idling is not necessary and should be avoided.

> Idling is endemic in our village particularly outside Marden Primary Academy at pick up and drop off times, outside shops and the Medical Centre.

> Why is idling bad? Idling, instead of turning your engine off while stationary, increases the amount of exhaust emissions in the air. These emissions contain several harmful gasses including carbon dioxide, which is bad for the environment and contributes towards climate change, as well as a range of other harmful gasses including nitrogen dioxide, carbon monoxide and hydrocarbons.

#### **Idling - Switch Off Your Engine Contd**

Pollutants from cars are linked to a range of health problems, from allergies and skin irritation to heart disease and respiratory problems such as asthma. Long-term repeated exposure to diesel exhaust fumes may also increase the risk of lung cancer, according to the World Health Organisation and there is growing evidence that some neurological conditions (e.g. Parkinson's Disease) can be linked to exposure to air pollutants.

Diesel vehicles, older ones in particular, are thought to be one of the biggest contributors to the problem due to high levels of nitrogen oxide and particulates.

So, let's try to keep our village pollutant free and our children healthy - please consider these factors and switch off your engine!

#### Kent Friends of the Tree Competition 2025

In liaison with various village groups and our Tree Warden, the Parish Council entered 'Sylvia' into the Tree of the Year Competition on behalf of Marden.

'Sylvia' who is a Beult Oak (named by one of the members of Marden Wildlife after the Goddess of the Forest) is accessible on the boundary of the parish just off the PROW KM229 which runs from Chainhurst to Stilebridge and is a very well used path where people can make a circular walk of the riverside land.



It is estimated that the tree is 300-400 years old and was 'pollarded' in ancient time and is thought to be the most beautiful oak in our area. 'Sylvia' has many burrs which hint at her great age, and she has probably been an important part of the Beult landscape for hundreds of years. She delights many riverside footpath walkers and her beauty, age and contribution to the landscape add further poignancy to this claim.

We have yet to find out whether 'Sylvia' has won this prestigious competition in Kent, but she would be very pleased if you went to visit her!

### Join the Movement for a Plastic Free Marden!

Since the project was launched last November, we've introduced the campaign to a wide range of supporters including residents, borough and parish councillors, local businesses and village groups. The Steering Committee which is made up of dedicated residents and three parish/borough councillors has met on a few occasions and we are

slowing progressing the project forward. We've already applied for Plastic Free Community status, and the Parish Council is leading by example by removing three single-use plastic items from its premises. To achieve our goals, we need to sign up at least 15 community allies (village groups / organisations) and all village organisations have been contacted asking for your support; recruit at least 5 independent business champions; and host at least two community events per year to raise awareness and inspire action. All you need to do is sign-up to remove 3 single-use items from your operations - such as packets of biscuit/sweet wrappers, cling film, plastic cups/plates.

### Marden Wildlife Update Lou Carpenter & Ray Morris

A productive summer culminated in a successful showing at the Weald of Kent Ploughing Match: our joint display with Kent Wildlife Trust, and the Marden Farmer Cluster, took first prize as the most informative stand.



Foremost on our display was the groundbreaking work raising scarce wildflowers to re-populate local meadows, and the restocking of local woodlands with 'genetically appropriate' Chequer trees, both of which have been helped by a bespoke nursery facility on a local farm with support from KCC, South East Water and Chambers Flower Farm. As well as trialling the reintroduction of disease-resistant Elm trees, this work will eventually provide Marden residents with a glimpse of what their forbears experienced before the huge, and largely detrimental to wildlife, postwar changes to rural Kent.

Our joint Marden Wildlife/Kent Wildlife Trust Turtle Dove study, with further funding from Natural England this year, continues to break new ground. GPS tracking reveals unexpected information about their occupation of both the Low and High Weald as they adapt to changes in land use. It seems Marden may now host an increasingly important 'hot spot' for the UK's most endangered birds on their autumn migration.

More ancient hedgerows have been surveyed for the national register and members' surveys continue to shine a light on local biodiversity. Recording all this information is no mean feat and we are proud that our own Karen Latchford has been shortlisted for an award from the National Biodiversity Network for tirelessly building Marden's prominence in the National Biodiversity Atlas. Well done, Karen!

#### **Police Surgeries**

Over the last few months several police surgeries/drop-in sessions have been organised – PCs Chad Maskell, George Head and our PCSO Becky Mount attended the Village Café on 13<sup>th</sup> June and 24th October, and at the Marden Dog Show on 10<sup>th</sup> August. At the session in the Village Club on 26th August concerns were raised over catapults (see article below). The next Police Surgery is in the Village Club on Monday 17th November between 5.00pm and 6.00pm.

These sessions are a good opportunity to raise any concerns you may have face-to-face and for the police to gather intel on what is going on in the village. You can also find out what your local officers are doing to tackle the issues that matter to you and learn more about how they are working to keep Marden safe.

#### **Crime Update**

Our Community Police Officers work closely with the Parish Council on enforcement and engaging with residents to gather intelligence.

Over the past few months there has been a number of anti-social behaviour incidents in the village the majority of which have been reported via 101. In June there was a police raid involving drugs and firearms and four people are under caution.

In the summer there was damage to benches on Southons Field, vandalism in the public toilets, various catapult issues, a suspected arson attack in August (see below) and a pony & trap was reported in Marden Playing Field etc.

Please remember it is so important to report any incidents of ASB and other non-emergency incidents to 101 or help to keep Kent Police phone lines free for emergency calls by reporting non-urgent incidents online. ### Launch of Marden Neighbourhood Watch Scheme

Kent Police held a stall at the Marden Dog Show in August where they launched a brand-new Neighbourhood Watch scheme for the area. Quite a few residents signed up and Ali has emailed those residents and will forward their details to Kent Police who are co-ordinating the scheme. If you want to make a real difference in your community and are interested in getting involved in the scheme, then please let Ali know.

#### Catapult Issues

Escalating catapult crime has become a real problem and there is intense peer pressure on social media sites like TikTok and Snapchat for youths to possess a catapult. As residents well know, there have been quite a lot of incidents in Marden alone.



Kent Police is cracking down on catapult crime after a man was reportedly shot in the face and a series of attacks on wildlife.

The force currently receives an average of 14 reports of catapult use per day, and officers will make an arrest and bring offenders to court if necessary. In July, officers sent a letter to schools warning there had been an increase in the weapons being used to harm or kill wildlife and damage property.

Catapult incidents are often underreported so Kent Police are
committed to tackling this issue head
on and police will speak to parents
and issue a Community Protection
Warning that requires them to ensure
their children do not carry or use
catapults in public.

If you know of anybody who has a catapult, please express your concerns about what damage can be done to both wildlife, property and people.

#### e-Scooters

Following numerous reports of the illegal and anti-social use of escooters, Maidstone Police are actively tackling the use of them. At the time of writing, 63 escooters had been seized this year. We remind everyone that escooters are illegal to use in a public place. They require valid insurance, a valid driver's licence and MOT.

#### WalkSafe Safety App

Kent Police have launched a safety app. August – it had been the family home WalkSafe is for anyone to use, regardless of gender and is a mobile app that allows users to share their location with trusted contacts, plan safe routes, and access real-time safety alerts. It also includes features such as:

- Live location sharing with family or friends
- Route planning with safety ratings based on local crime data

The app also allows users to report local issues, for example poor street lighting and cat-calling. This data is fed back to police, allowing for targeted operations and improvements to the local community.

Officers are appealing for information and confirmed the incident is being treated as arson. Police are also investigating if a burglary reported at the property on 11<sup>th</sup> August is connected.



### **YOUTH PROVISION**

As you know, KCC no longer have the resources to run a youth club in the village and thank you to those residents who provided feedback on the Quality-of-Life Survey which included improved youth provision, more activities for young people and creating a youth club.

A Blue Light Event was held in Staplehurst in August by Kent Police for 14-25-year-olds and they would like to run this event again next year to encourage community contact with ward police and the community protection team. Hopefully this event can be run in Marden.



#### **Kent Cricket Community Trust**

Cllr Adrian Rabot has been engaging with the Kent Cricket Community Trust to explore if their unique mobile engagement hub - the No Boundaries Bus - can be brought to Marden next year to undertake some detached youth work. This specially equipped minibus features DJ decks, PlayStation 5 consoles, and a chill-out space, creating a safe and inspiring environment for young people to connect and play. It's a mobile community centre that supports structured multi-sport sessions and offers a space for creative downtime. If we are successful in securing a few sessions at Marden Playing Field next year, we will let residents know.

#### Marden Memorial Hall Update October 2025

The original Memorial Hall building dates back to the 1860's, with additions in the 1930's and more recently in 2010. The Hall Trustees are regularly ensuring that maintenance is kept up to date and where possible improvements take place.

The floor of the Main Hall has been sanded and resealed since our last update about improvements to the Hall.

A large automatic projector screen has been installed in the Main Hall so that all our halls now have projector screens. The Ladies toilets have been completely re- furbished this Summer and the rear lobby has been decorated. In addition, Trustees have purchased a new range cooker for the kitchen. Plans for 2026 include upgrading the kitchen as well as completing the re decoration of the halls and all lobby areas.

Since installing solar batteries, to complement our solar panels, in August 2024 on average about 50% of our electricity has been selfgenerated, rising to over 80% in the sunny summer months.

Our thanks go to Marden in Bloom who have done such a great job with the garden area and planters at the front of the Hall.

# Community Statement on Flag Displays from Maidstone Borough Council

Recent flag displays have prompted a range of views within our community. In a democracy, people will hold differing opinions, and respectful dialogue is key to maintaining cohesion.

While many individuals engage in public displays lawfully and peacefully, it's important to remain mindful of the broader context. National safeguarding guidance highlights that, in some cases, such displays may be used to provoke or signal affiliation with divisive ideologies. This does not reflect the intentions of the majority, but it is a risk that public bodies are asked to monitor.

It is important that residents seek reliable information, avoid misinformation on social media, and continue to support one another in creating a safe, inclusive, and respectful community.

Any flags, graffiti, or public messaging that contain racial, hateful, or extremist content should be reported to the relevant authorities, such as the Maidstone Borough Council or Kent Police.

During the summer holidays, building work on our new EYFS/Year 1 building has continued, and we are excited to report that there is now a visible structure. In the upcoming weeks, various groups of children will have the opportunity to visit the site and learn more about the building process, fostering their engagement in this important development.

This academic year has already presented us with numerous enriching learning experiences. The EYFS children had the pleasure of being visited by a representative from the Blue Cross, who provided insightful teachings on animal care. Additionally, Year 6 benefited from a visit by one of our parents, an expert in artificial intelligence (AI). Our entire school community was also treated to a captivating woodwind demonstration by one of our visiting music teachers. #### Safe Anaesthesia Worldwide (SAWW) – Carol Newman, Secretary

Safe Anaesthesia Worldwide (SAWW) is a local charity with an international reach that works to improve anaesthesia services in low-income countries. Worldwide 5 billion people lack access to safe anaesthesia and surgery and as a result, millions suffer disability or death.

SAWW works to change this by providing suitable equipment and training to hospitals in poor countries. Recent donations have included sending:

- A Glostavent anaesthesia machine for a new operating theatre at Edna Adan Hospital, Somaliland.
- Two respiratory devices (CPAP) to treat babies with life-threatening breathing difficulties at Chaurjahari Hospital, Nepal.

- Five patient monitors, crucial for monitoring the condition of patients during and after surgery, to Adigrat Hospital, Ethiopia.
- Adult and paediatric intubation mannequins for instructing trainee anaesthetists to safely intubate patients, to the University of Graben Hospital, Democratic Republic of Congo.

The impact of all these donations has been to improve anaesthesia services, prevent suffering and save lives. Thank you to everyone who enabled SAWW to make these donations. SAWW wouldn't exist without the goodwill and generosity of the local people who have supported our work.

We continue to organise monthly talks on a variety of subjects as follows:


